### Corrective Drill

As a U.S. Marine, I recognized that Chad Adams's "Tap. Rack. Bang." (Sportsman's Notebook) is almost word for word the military's standard doctrine for clearing a stoppage. However, we teach junior Marines to tap, cant, rack, bang—cant the rifle to whichever side the ejection port is on, before racking the charging handle. If there is a casing jammed in the bolt, gravity will aid in removing it.
